

#### March 2024: The Festival of St. Patrick



In the month of March there is another well-known celebration day named in honor of a saint. March 17 is St. Patrick's Day. How do you celebrate St. Patrick's Day? Most of us will try to wear green. Some will go out an celebrate with special drinks or food (maybe green beer?). Do you know why we celebrate St. Patrick's day?

Patrick was born to his parents, Calphurnis and Conchessa, at Saul, near Kilpatrick, Ireland in the year 387. At the age of 16 he was kidnapped by Irish marauders and sold into salvery. His slave master, Milchu, was a druid high priest. Patrick was assigned to feed Milchu's animals and flocks. During the six years of Patrick's captivity, he would seek God and His love. He would also acquire and master the Celtic language. These six years became preparation for later ministry to the Irish people. After six years in captivity, church tradition holds that Patrick was prompted by an angel to run away and flee from his master and his slavery. Now free from a cruel master, he eventually found passage via ship to his home in Britain.

St. Patrick, upon returning home, pledged his life to service in the church as a response for the freedom God had given him from slavery. He prepared for ministry and later, at the request of Pope Celestine I, was returned to Ireland to bring those lands and communities into the fold of the church. Patrick was not the first to be given such an assignment, others had tried and feared the often-violent response of the Irish. As Patrick first arrived to Ireland the Druids immediately took up arms against him. Patrick sailed around to find a more peaceful place to start his mission. Eventually he landed at the place he had once been a slave. He presented to his former master a sum of money necessary to repay him for his freedom. It was here that Patrick would begin his ministry.

#### Burnout – And How to Stop It

The American Psychological Association (APA) has found that burnout is at an all-time high across numerous professions, stirred on by the COVID-19 pandemic and a potent mix of personal, professional, and health-related stress. The World Health Organization (WHO) calls it an "occupational phenomenon." Although prevalent among caretaking professions, such as teachers and healthcare workers, burnout has become a broad symptom of overwork in difficult times.

This results in being overwhelmed for too long of a time. Burnout is much more than simply passing stress – it is an accumulation of tension, exertion, and hopelessness that is hard to identify. So what are some common symptoms or signs that you're on the road to burnout?

Burnout is the result of chronic stress, usually (though not exclusively) workplace related. Dr. Josh Briley (clinical psychologist and fellow of the American Institute of Stress) says, "If the employee feels overwhelmed, under-appreciated, and powerless to make effective changes in their job duties, or workplace culture, then burnout is likely to occur." Burnout can go far beyond the workplace and can extend into every aspect of your life, which can cause a drastic increase in likelihood of many serious medical conditions. Symptoms are likely to be anxiety, insomnia, or depression, with an increased risk of physical illness as well, i.e. high blood pressure, heart problems, hypercholesterolemia, and diabetes.

Here are some common signs of burnout:

- 1. Exhaustion physical and fatigue, simple tasks more burdensome, more tired than usual, hard to get through the day and loss of energy.
- 2. Feeling of dread and lack of motivation anxiety, even after a couple of days off from work, enthusiasm low and procrastination is another key sign.
- 3. Difficulty sleeping contributes to burnout and burnout affects good quality of sleep causing cycles of restlessness and insomnia. This can lead to headaches, body tension, and stomach problems.
- Inconsistent appetite either loss of appetite or binging (craving sweets).
- Cynicism and irritability mood can be the first to plummet in the early stages of burnout which can coincide with decreased productivity and focus. This can lead personal and professional relationships to suffer.


What can be done to reverse burnout?

- 1. Rethink screen time limit time on screens or devices, set limits.
- 2. Focus of self-care exercise, meditation, healthy diet, disconnect from work, engage in joyful activities, spend time with those you love, and minimize the amount of time you vent about work.
- 3. Take a break time off, vacation, leave of absence, and spend time in nature.
- 4. Talk with a mental health professional talk therapy, state-funded or private and clinics have numerous ways to treat stress.
- Be open to change envision a different life, different relationship with work, look at the bigger structural changes you can make in your life, change jobs, reduce hours, or new responsibilities at work.

The Road to Recovery requires support from your employers, family, co-workers, and friends. Establish a new work-life balance and mindfulness practices that will benefit you.

#### Pastor Hesse's article continued:

Patrick's message of redemption was offered and greatly received by a number of people. One Druid Chief Dichu, who initially sought to kill Patrick, upon drawing his sword, his arm is said to have become as rigid as a statue. Dichu eventually converted to the faith seeking Patrick's instruction. The new faith moved Dichu to give Patrick a barn in which to do his ministry. After this, Patrick's old master gathered his treasures into his house and set the whole thing on fire, throwing himself into the flames. He could not tolerate being mastered by his former slave. Patrick continued his ministry and message of redemption in Jesus Christ. Often St. Patrick would use the clover to describe the nature of God. The color of green for St. Patrick's day is the color of Ireland. St. Patrick died in Saul, Downpatrick, Ireland on March 17, 493 having been credited for liberating the Irish from the oppression of Druidism and bringing them the redemption of Christ.

No doubt there will be opportunity for us to once again celebrate St. Patrick's Day. However, as we celebrate it is also an opportunity for us to bring witness to Jesus. St. Patrick's Day is a celebration of the church not just the Irish. So remember these words, "Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. " Hebrews 13:7

Registration for Summer 2024 Camp Lone Star in LaGrange, Texas is almost over!




